Happy New Year and welcome to Writing West Midlands' programme of events and activities for creative writers in the West Midlands.

We are starting some new projects while working hard to sustain activities and invest in writers and writing over the long term.

Our new Young Writers' Foundation Group is designed for young people aged 16 to 20, with four day workshops across the year. In addition we are delighted to host the Birmingham and West Midlands final of the Poetry by Heart competition, testing young people in performing contemporary and classic poetry. Young writers and performers will also want to take part in our third Page Talk Young Writers' Week & Festival, in Stafford.

Our writing industry work continues, too. Room 204, our writer development programme, will be recruiting again in February, and our third Student Writers' Toolkit takes place on 28th February. If you are a student or recently graduated come along to connect with the people and organisations who make creative writing happen.

Additionally, we have Writer Networking sessions happening in Stafford and Dudley in January and March, and another short course on working on a first poetry collection, led by Jane Commane of Nine Arches Press.

Literature and writers in performance are important as ever. Short & Sweet is a new monthly opportunity for writers to test out fiction in performance. We are also looking forward to Jonathan Coe's performance of some of his short stories with gifted musicians in April, and we are honoured to jointly present the regional launch of David Lodge's memoir, Quite a Good Time to be Born.

Finally, a few messages. While we are supported by Arts Council England and other funders, much of our income is generated by sales - tickets for events but also books and our near-legendary West Midlands Writers Tea Towels... ROOM 204 OPEN FOR APPLICATIONS FOR 2015-16

Room 204 is Writing West Midlands' writer development programme. Every year we select fifteen emerging writers from the West Midlands to work with us on a programme of creative career development.

Rather than a scheme that looks at improving the quality of their writing, Room 204 selects candidates based on the existing high quality of their work and their need for support. It offers writers a year of close contact with the organisation in the form of 1-1 meetings, group networking sessions and occasional workshops, access to an information-sharing group on Facebook and a free place at Writing West Midlands' annual conference, The Writers' Toolkit.

DOES CREATIVE WRITING POSITIVELY IMPACT YOUNG PEOPLE'S WELL-BEING?

Yes it does! Through 2014 we have been measuring the well-being of young people involved in our young writers' projects. Funded by the Paul Hamlyn Foundation, we have initiated a series of questionnaires and activities to see how engagement with creative writing activities can positively influence different aspects of well-being for a young person.

Measurement of our ongoing Write On! groups will continue through to March 2015 but so far we have seen a positive difference in young writers who have taken part in the Page Talk Young Writers' Week and Festival and our Young Writers' Summer School in 2014.

• Life satisfaction increased by 15%, emotional well-being increased by 22% and self-esteem increased by 8% for

participants aged 12-16.

- Emotional well-being, self-esteem and satisfaction with friends all rose by 10-12% in participants aged 16-19.
- Here's what some of our young writers had to say; "I really enjoyed hearing other people's work and doing things I don't usually do because it's inspired me to write different things." Young Writers' Summer School participant.

"It's something I would recommend to everyone, even if you just want to improve your writing or make some new friends. It was by far one of the best experiences of my life and I would do it all over again if I could." – Page Talk participant.



SHORT COURSE: TOWARDS A POETRY COLLECTION

27 January – 10 March (excl. 17 February), 6 – 8pm Wattlewood Room, St John's Museum, Warwick, CV34 4NF

As part of a six week course, Jane Commane (poet, tutor and editor at Nine Arches Press) will guide you through the process of curating and creating a collection of your poetry. Discover the different ways to get into print, find the right shape and form for your collection, and right sort of publisher for you. Whether it's a pamphlet, book collection or mini-epic, discover how best to refine, hone and polish your poems so they can shine and show your writing at its best. Also, get plenty of practical tips on how to build up your reputation and profile as a poet, how to submit your collection, and how to structure, order and develop your collection of poems. The course will also include short one-to-one feedback sessions on individual collections with the workshop tutor.





Though the workshops won't result in the actual publication of your collection, they will equip you with all the know-how, techniques and best practices to help you make the important first steps through what can seem a daunting process. Prepare to have a few myths about poetry publishing busted, develop your poetic confidence and brush up your editing skills!



His novels include *The Rotters' Club* and *What a Carve Up!* He has always been interested in the relationship between music and spoken word, and tonight he will be in performance with the pianist Danny Manners and flautist Theo Travis.

Danny Manners started out exploring classical music as a teenager and has been involved in improvised 'leftfield' music. He has worked with Coe before, providing the music to several audio versions of Coe's short stories. Theo Travis was born in Birmingham; he studied classical music at the University of Manchester and tours regularly with the Theo Travis Quartet, and Gong.

Jonathan will be reading texts from some of his novels, and a short story specially written for the performance with live music.
